



Why God Created Humanity – Pt. 3

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Hosea 4:6 My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge. Because you have rejected knowledge, I also will reject you from being priest for Me;

Notice it wasn't that the knowledge wasn't made available, it was that humanity rejected the mind and the ways of God to do their own thing.

God, Expanding His family into another Realm:

To follow God's purpose for humanity, we must understand that God created the earth to be an exact replica of heaven.

Jesus instructs us to pray that this earth will become a replica of Heaven.

“Your Kingdom to come and Your will to be done on earth as it is in heaven”.

God has a family in Heaven, which Bible refers to as "sons of God."

Job 1:6-7, "Now there was a day when the sons of God came to present themselves before the Lord, and Satan also came among them. And the Lord said to Satan, 'From where do you come?'"

When it says that the sons of God presented themselves before Him, there are probably 2 main reasons why they did so.

1. To demonstrate their loyalty to God. Members of a royal court would present themselves to the king as a public display of their loyalty and submission to his authority.
2. Conduct official business. A royal court served as the center of government and administration, where the king, with his advisors, would deliberate on matters of state, foreign policy, and judicial decisions.

When these sons of God presented themselves before Almighty God, they came to report on their responsibilities and the status of their work within the Kingdom.

This is why the blood of Jesus is applied to our hearts and to the throne of Heaven so we can have personal access to the royal court room of God, present our offerings, and receive what we need to do kingdom business.

When we pray, praise, and give, we need to see ourselves coming before the throne of God.

God wants an earthly family.

After God created Adam, He established a Personal relationship with Adam. God then introduced humanity to family by presenting man with a woman.

Spending time alone with God allowed Adam to gain insights into the significance of family relationships and the qualities that his companion should possess.



Genesis 2:18-20 And the Lord God said, "It is not good that man should be alone; I will make him a helper comparable to him." 19 Out of the ground the Lord God formed every beast of the field and every bird of the air, and brought them to Adam to see what he would call them. And whatever Adam called each living creature, that was its name. 20 So Adam gave names to all cattle, to the birds of the air, and to every beast of the field. But for Adam there was not found a helper comparable to him."

In these verses, we see that God brought the animals to Adam to see what names he would assign to them. This was Adam's first recorded assignment from God.

Because Adam spent time with God, he was able to understand the purpose of each living creature that God presented to him. This understanding led him to realize that none of the animals were suitable companions for him, given Adam's purpose and assignment on Earth.

Therefore, when God provided the proper helper for him, he understood the purpose of their relationship.

Genesis 2:23-24 states, "And Adam said: 'This is now bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man.' Therefore, a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and they shall become one flesh."

There are two important points to recognize here.

First: When God created Adam, he was like Him, but yet of another kind. When God created woman for man, she was like him but of another kind.

By understanding his purpose and assignment from God, as listed in Genesis 1:26-30, Adam recognized the need to unite with someone of equal standing, thereby fulfilling his purpose and assignment, as they were designed to complement each other perfectly.

Genesis 1:26-30 Then God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness; let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." 27 So God created man in His own image; in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them. 28 Then God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it; have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over every living thing that moves on the earth." 29 And God said, "See, I have given you every herb that yields seed which is on the face of all the earth, and every tree whose fruit yields seed; to you it shall be for food. 30 Also, to every beast of the earth, to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, in which there is life, I have given every green herb for food"; and it was so.

The reason why Adam knew he needed a companion was because his purpose He received from God here in Genesis chapter 2, God was talking about fulfilling that purpose, not as an individual, but as a family.

Genesis 1:27 ... "in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them. 28 Then God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply".

Secondly, Adam understood the purpose of this family union, marriage. He realized that being united in marriage with someone who is like him, yet different, would require a covenant, a commitment to forsake even one's own parents.



Genesis 2:23 ...Therefore, a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and they shall become one flesh."

This is why the first commandment that God gives His people is a commandment that they should not commit idolatry. In other words, they would be in covenant with no one else on the same level as they are in covenant with Him.

Exodus 20:2-3: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. 3 "You shall have no other gods before Me."

The entire family dynamic is beautifully illustrated through the lens of God's relationship with humanity. In this portrayal, God the Father embodies the role of a nurturing parent, offering guidance, love, and support.

Jesus Christ emerges as the beloved Son, demonstrating unwavering devotion and sacrifice to the Father and His will. Jesus is the one who unites God and man, for He is fully God and fully man at the same time.

The Church serves as a collective community of believers, united in faith as children of God. This community embodies a significant sense of unity and is often described as the bride of Christ, symbolizing a committed partnership with the Son of God.

Within this framework, the Church fosters a deep and loving connection among its members, emphasizing the importance of relationships within the Gods divine family.
